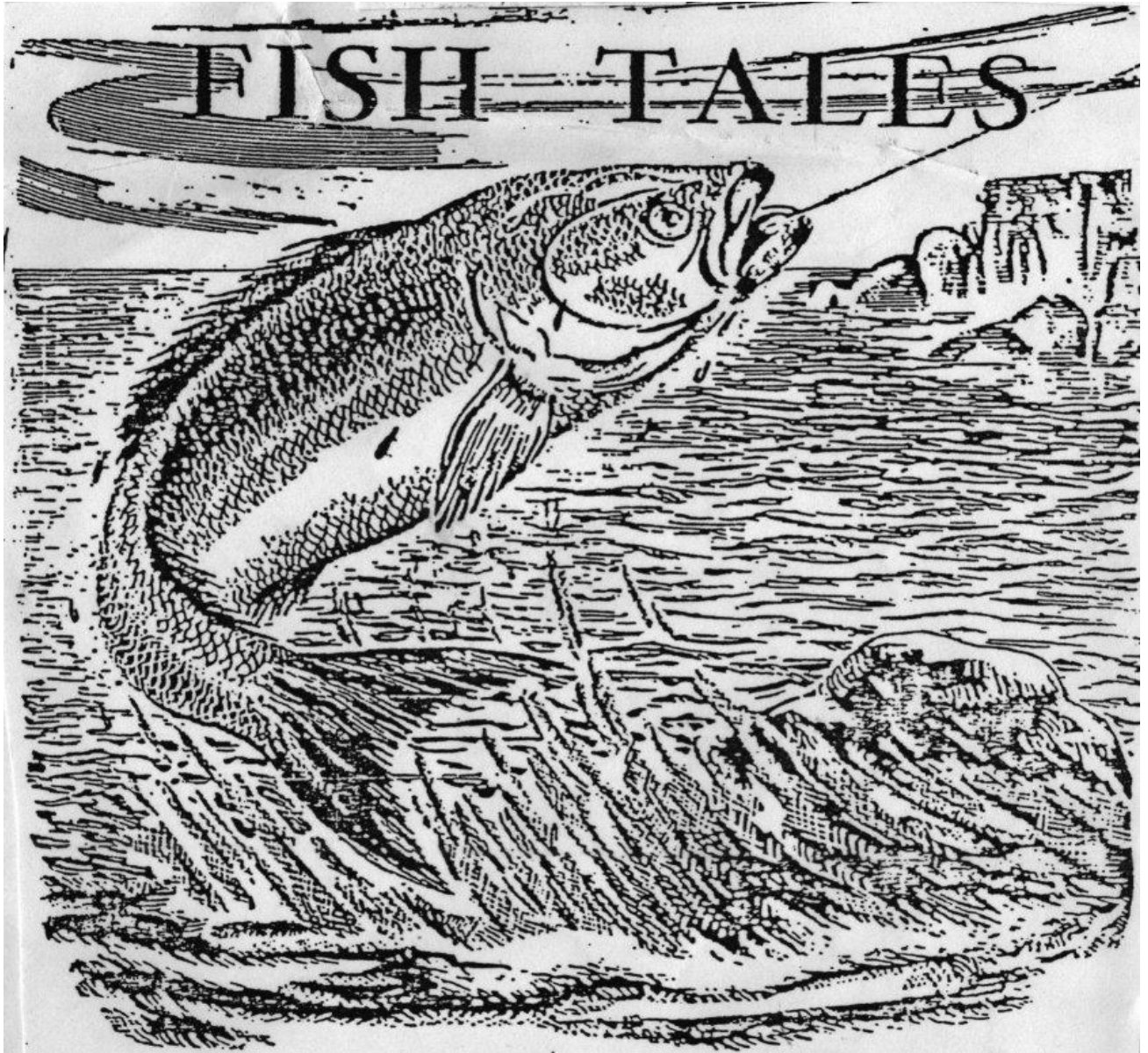

## **DRUMMERS:**

All drummer species are herbivores, although they have been known to enjoy a juicy bit of prawn bait at times. They school in large groups. All are grey in colour with darker fins and faint dark lines along each scale row.

The blackfishes are more elongate than the drummers and more variable in colour, but once again, the main specie of black fish we catch down south is nearly totally black, its close cousin the zebra fish which is closely related to the eastern states luderick are much lighter and the vertical body stripes show distinctly, they are quite plentiful between the Cape to Capes. They differ in that their stripes are less in number, also stripes much broader. Being herbivores drummers and black fish feed in short, intense bursts, usually at dawn and dusk, they quickly dine on seaweed, which is digested by intestinal bacteria. Drummers and black fish are motley of temperate and tropical water, they are in all southern Australian States. Here in WA we don't treat their flesh as good edible quality, whereas in some of the eastern states they are eaten regularly, especially in NSW where anglers fish the luderick for their prized flavour. In some parts of the world eating the flesh of drummers was reputed to cause vivid dreams. Consequently they were given the name of "Dreamfish". They grow to approx 15 kilo.

For members that want to fish for them, the best bait is flour and water dough or some of the green seaweed you see washed up on the beach. But as stated above they have been known to take a meat bait.

## SEA SNAKES:

Unlike most sea snakes, the common sea snake is not fully adapted to a marine life. They come ashore to lay their eggs. Using the wide scales on their belly - which are more like those of the land snakes than of a true sea snake - for grip, they clamber over rocks and even climb low cliffs to find a suitable cave or crevice. For this reason, herpetologists regard them as intermediate types between land and true aquatic snakes. Like all sea snakes, however, they have powerful venom with quickly immobilize their prey.

One of the true sea snakes is the Banded sea snake. This species is so well adapted to life at sea that it cannot survive if washed up on land. Unlike the common sea snake, it has no wide belly scales with which to grip the ground and return itself back to the sea.

Adaptation to aquatic life include a laterally flattened body, a paddle like tail with which it propels itself, and nostrils situated on top of the head that can be closed by flaps when it dives. It does not even come to shore to breed; it is ovoviviparous - that is, the female produces eggs that are retained within her body until they hatch and are born, but unlike a mammal she does not nourish the two to six developing young.

The powerful venom of this snake can cause death of animals and man.

## ROUND WORMS

Round worms' infestation in humans affect some one thousand million people world wide. Elephantiasis (*lymphatic filariasis*) is a disfiguring disease of the tropics infected upon over 250 million individuals . These are just two of the many cause by roundworms (*Nematoda*).

The nematodes are among the most successful group of animals. They have exploited all forms of aquatic environment and many live in damp soil. Some are even hardy enough to survive in hostile environments like hot springs, deserts and cider vinegar.

Furthermore, by parasitizing both animal and plants they have widely extended their habitat ranges, thus they are significant crop pests and the agents of disease in plants, animals and man.

There are many types of Nematode, but these animals are all quite similar. They are typically worm shaped. Their bodies are not divided into segments or regions and generally taper toward front and back. The mouth lies at the front and the anus almost in the tail.

Their outer skin that is protected by a highly impermeable and resistant cuticle is the secret of the success of this group. The cuticle is complex in structure and is made up of several layers of different chemical composition, each with a different structure layout. The precise form of the cuticle varies from species to species, but in the common gut parasite of man and domestic animals, *Ascaris*, it comprises an outermost keratinized layer, a thick middle layer and a basal layer of three strata of collagen fibres which cross each other obliquely. These flex with respect to each other and allow the animal to make its typical wave like movements, brought about by the longitude muscle fibres. Size varies from below 0.5 to approx 1 meter.

## **\$38,000 FINE FOR ILLEGAL POSSESSION OF FROZEN FISH FILLETS**

A recreational fisher has been ordered to pay a fine, mandatory penalty and court costs totalling more than \$38,000 for illegal possession of fish.

Trevor Waters, aged 46, of Yunderup failed to appear in the Mandurah Magistrates Court this week, after being issued with a summons to attend. He was found guilty in his absence. The case relates to the illegal possession of 145.17 kg of frozen fish fillets – 125.17 kg over the state-wide individual possession limit – following a surveillance and apprehension operation by Fisheries and Marine Officers in the Gascoyne and the Perth metropolitan area. As part of the surveillance work, Fisheries and Marine Officers observed him collecting a consignment of eight foam boxes from a commercial transport company at Perth Airport and placing them in his truck. The officers then tailed Mr Waters to South Yunderup Road, Ravenswood, where they intercepted him and seized the consignment. When questioned, he told officers he had been away on a fishing trip where he and his friends had caught fish and freighted them down from Carnarvon and Exmouth for collection at Perth. His name was listed as the receiver of the fish on the consignment notes and each of the boxes, but he claimed that, as the skipper of the boat, he was collecting the fish on behalf of his friends.

Department of Fisheries South Metropolitan Compliance Manager John Breeden said Fisheries' regulations clearly stated that it was illegal to be in possession of fish over the 20 kilogram-limit, whether they are for personal consumption or for distribution to others. "These rules are in place to ensure fishers take sustainable amounts of fish to ensure there are fish for the future for all to enjoy," Mr Breeden said. "The size of the fine should act as a strong message to all recreational fishers transporting fish fillets from fishing trips, to make sure they do not exceed the individual possession limit and this also includes all fish held at their residence." In Wednesday's court hearing (20 July 2011), the Magistrate issued a fine \$750 dollars for the offence, a mandatory additional penalty of \$37,551 dollars and costs of \$121.95 under the excess possession limit (Category 1 – Finfish) clause of the Fish Resources Management Act.

The mandatory additional penalty was based on a total of \$300 per kilogram of fillets that was calculated from 10 times the value of the fillets, which were prescribed as 30 dollars per kilogram. ## **AN EYE IN THE SKY ASSESSES SHORE-BASED FISHING ON PERTH COAST**

Research, funded through the WA Government's Natural Resource Management (NRM) strategy, is helping to fill knowledge gaps about shore-based fishing effort along Perth's coast. Department of Fisheries Supervising Scientist Dr Dan Gaughan said aerial surveys of beach fishing, with observers patrolling the coast between Lancelin and Bunbury, which is one component of a larger study, have now been completed. "Many of the near-shore fish communities off the Perth coast in particular are targeted by both boat-based and shore-based fishers, but there is a lack of good data on the shore-based catch of recreational fishers," Dr Gaughan said.

"We have been gathering data to better determine whether management arrangements to reduce the fishing pressure on off-shore demersal species may have shifted some recreational fishing effort to shore and near-shore areas. Data gathered during the demersal closed season was particularly important."

Dr Gaughan said the \$300,000 project was continuing, using a more conventional land-based survey strategy. The ongoing data collection could be compared against the results of the aerial flights, as well as remote camera surveys, to assess the most cost-effective options for ongoing surveys of near-shore fishing. "To effectively manage fisheries we need good knowledge about how and where people are fishing, so we can better manage popular fishing species," he said.

"Around 80 per cent of the State's recreational fishing effort occurs in the West Coast Bioregion and it is well understood the majority of that effort is focussed around Perth. "A considerable number of people fish from the shore. They not only get out there to catch a feed, but also to enjoy the social and recreational aspects of beach fishing and it is important that we maintain that opportunity for future generations." Dr Gaughan said other ongoing research projects by the Department of Fisheries were examining the stock status for important shore based target species like herring, tailor and whiting.

"This NRM funded research will help us learn how we can cost-effectively measure the catch of shore-based fishers to ensure the needs of anglers can be met in a sustainable manner."
