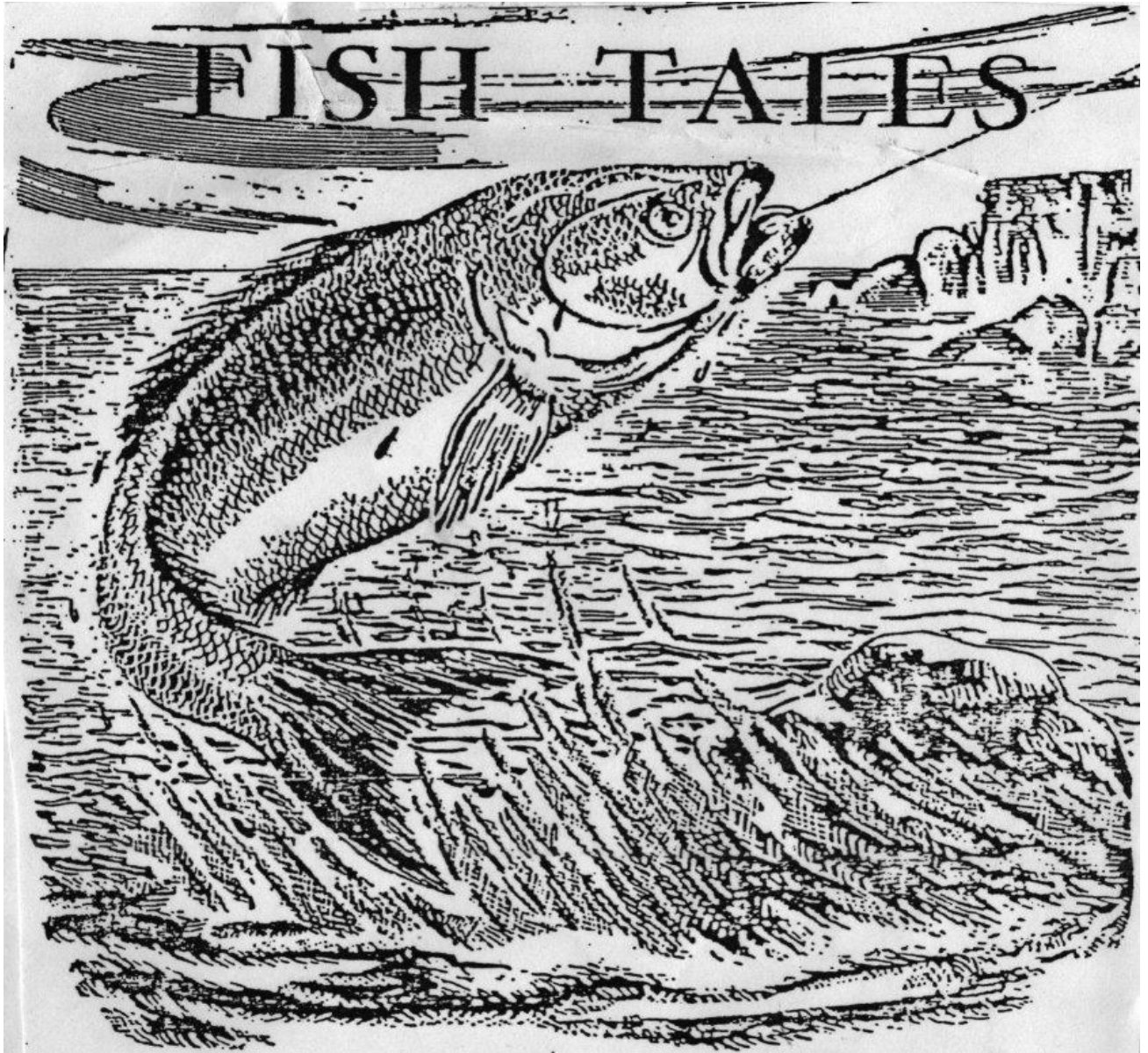

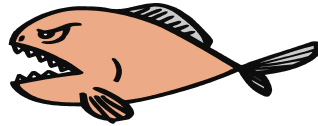
Thank you once again to Jeremy Schrader for his ASF report. The final instalment has been published in this month's *Fish Tales*.

Firstly, congratulations to Carolyn Benniman for correctly naming January's mystery fish. Well done, Carolyn. It was, of course, a Silver Drummer.

Thanks to Larry Baker who also answered correctly, but not before Carolyn.

WHAT FISH IS IT?

A small family represented by a single species in Western and South Australia. The lower rays of the pectoral fin are thickened and unbranched, and the teeth are flattened, curved inwards and trilobate.

D.xvii,17 P.14. A.iii,6. V.i,5 L.lat.101-103

Body elongated and robust, not much compressed, the dorsal and ventral profile evenly arched. Mouth small and horizontal, the gape extending back to the posterior nostril, but not reaching the eye. Teeth in five or six irregular rows in each jaw, each tooth trilobed and curve inwards, the middle lobe much longer than the other two. A single dorsal fin which is deeply notched the spinous and soft portions about equal in length. Pectoral fin large and rounded, the lower rays undivided. Body covered with small cycloid scales which form a low sheath on the base of the spinous dorsal fin. Head naked with the exception of two patches of very small scales on each side. Colour dark greenish-brown above, lighter on the sides and white below. Upper parts with four dark blotches, one of which extends on to the soft dorsal fin, the sides with darker mottling. Length to 43cm. Distribution Western Australia, South Australia, Victoria, Tasmania.

RECREATIONAL FISHERS HELP NEW LOGBOOK SURVEY AIMED AT RESEARCHING FISH CATCH

Fisheries Minister Norman Moore has urged recreational fishers to get involved with the most comprehensive fishing survey ever conducted in Western Australia. Mr Moore said many had already agreed to participate in a group of 3,000 boat-based fishers who will record their fishing activities in logbooks for a 12-month period and share the information with the Department of Fisheries. "These fishers are helping provide better catch data for the recreational sector and I urge anglers to support all aspects of this research initiative," he said. "Logbooks are the cornerstone of this important new survey, but information will also be obtained through interviews with recreational fishers at boat ramps, additional phone surveys and from contacts with fishers by Fisheries' staff. "The department expects to contact up to 23,000 recreational fishers during the survey period. "The supply, catch and effort information this survey will provide will give us more comprehensive data to help the better management of our fisheries. "Department of Fisheries' researchers will also record video images at major boat ramps which will assist in validating fishing effort over 24-hour periods."

The Minister said the 12-month survey, done in collaboration with Edith Cowan and Murdoch universities, and Recfishwest would provide more robust estimates of the quantity of fish retained and released by recreational fishers. The survey is funded from revenue generated by the Recreational Fishing from a Boat Licence (RFBL) and is an example of how the money raised by the RFBL is spent to benefit recreational fishers. "Researchers will, for the first time, estimate catches for every marine bioregion in WA and cover all fishing times across the day and all access points, using data from boat-based fishers around the State," Mr Moore said. The Minister encouraged recreational fishers to assist with the survey if they were contacted or interviewed by survey staff during the year. "I believe most recreational fishers know the value of having fish for the future and how more comprehensive information about fishing activity will help ensure we can continue to manage WA fisheries in a sustainable way," Mr Moore said.

RECREATIONAL MARINA PLANNED FOR ROUS HEAD HARBOUR AT FREMANTLE.

The proposed Rous Head Harbour marina at Fremantle is likely to include more than 100 boat pens and will also feature cafes, offices and tourism facilities. Premier Colin Barnett recently announced expressions of interest had been invited from the private sector for development proposals to create a vibrant new mixed-use marina. “The provision of additional boat pens in this area was an election commitment of this Government to help meet the needs of recreational boat users,” Mr Barnett said.

“Demand for boat pens in the metropolitan area is strong and continues to grow - the Rous Head marina is an outstanding opportunity to create an attractive, well-located development to help meet this need. “The marina plans are still very much at the conceptual stage, with some preliminary work done by Fremantle Ports and the Department of Transport on the kind of mixed-use facility that could be developed in this location.”

Onshore boat stacking facilities, a ferry terminal and commercial space for charter vessels will be considered in the development. “Ensuring the proposed marina is compatible with Fremantle’s working port is essential and will be a key consideration in assessing proposals,” the Premier said. Transport Minister Simon O’Brien said prospective developers would be encouraged to prepare their own innovative designs to balance the interests of Fremantle Ports, the State and the community. Public access to North Mole and Rous Head Harbour would also be improved by a new road around land newly reclaimed as part of the Inner Harbour deepening.

Mr O’Brien said planning, cultural heritage and environmental approvals would be obtained for the marina project. “Given the number of issues to be taken into account, community consultation will be important in progressing to the more detailed planning stage,” he said.

A call for Expressions of Interest will close on 11 February 2011.

Short-listed proponents will then detail their proposals for the development and operation of the marina and related facilities on a long-term lease basis.

PRIZE FOR DONATED FISH FRAMES

Have you ever wondered how the Fisheries Department come up with the data that they use? For those who think they spend countless days on the water catching fish for research, I'm afraid the real answer is a little different. Although research vessels play an integral role, much of the data is derived from fish frames donated by recreational anglers. The fish frame is the skeleton, from head to tail, with the guts intact, that is left after the fish has been filleted. Fisheries scientists use frames to determine the age structure of certain fish species, which helps estimate the status of stocks in a given area. Much can be gained from a simple fish frame, including length, sex, reproductive capability, diet, and even the fish's age.

Recreational anglers have been encouraged to donate their fish frames to the Department for some time now, and many have been doing so regularly. The great news announced by the Department of Fisheries this week, is that one lucky donor of fish frames and a friend of their choice will be off on a charter to the Montebello Islands courtesy of Montebello Island Safaris. The prize, worth more than \$5,000, will go to one lucky fisher who has donated their fish skeletons and provided the relevant details of their catch before June 2011. Department of Fisheries Director of Research Dr Rick Fletcher said he was delighted to see fishing businesses getting behind this important initiative. "Fish frames are vital to our research programs so we can manage our fish stocks sustainably ensuring there are fish for the future," Dr Fletcher said. "It's great that Montebello Island Safaris are supporting us in this as well as members of the tackle industry. On behalf of the Department, I thank them all for helping us in this work."

Recfishwest encourages all recreational fishers to donate frames for research. Fisheries researchers are particularly interested in Dhufish, Pink Snapper and Baldchin Groper, but also all Whiting species, Tailor, Herring and Garfish. At the present time, researchers only need frames from within the West Coast Bioregion (north of Kalbarri to east of Augusta). Frames from both the Metropolitan and South-West zones in the West Coast Bioregion are much sought after, so if you fish in either of those two areas, consider the sustainability of the species when you're at the filleting bench. Remember, the more often you donate, the more chances you have of winning!!

ROADSIDE CHECK SNARES ALLEGED OUT OF SEASON MARRON FISHER

The next marron season opened on Saturday, January 8 and Fisheries and Marine Officers are already on patrol to prevent illegal fishing of WA's unique freshwater crayfish. As a result, a 44-year old Bunbury man is due to face the Busselton Court, early in January, for allegedly being in possession of 48 cooked marron, during the closed season. The man has now been formally charged, after being apprehended during a joint Police and Fisheries roadside check on the Vasse Highway near Nannup on Sunday (7 November). Department of Fisheries Compliance Manager South, Steve Embling said the man was stopped and searched and the marron haul was found in an icebox. "Fisheries and Marine Officers also located and seized a fish landing net and two crustacean traps," Mr Embling said. "If found guilty the man could face a general fine of up to \$5,000 and a mandatory penalty of between \$2,400 and \$7,092 can be applied according to the number or weight of marron seized." Western Australia's wild stock marron fishery is only open for a limited season every year, in order to protect the sustainability of the fishery. Rules also apply during the season, to ensure fishers do not take undersize marron or more marron than the limits allow.

The 2011 season will run from 12 noon on 8 January through until 12 noon on 5 February. Mr Embling said the Department of Fisheries now had additional resources it could apply to marron compliance patrols and out of season checks on South West waterways. "We have access to dedicated mobile patrols, in highly visible 4-wheel-drives, to carry out extensive patrols – even to remote locations," he said. "These patrols deliver a mix of education and enforcement and people are certainly noticing them. The mobile patrols offer great support to our district officers who are also in the field conducting compliance operations.
