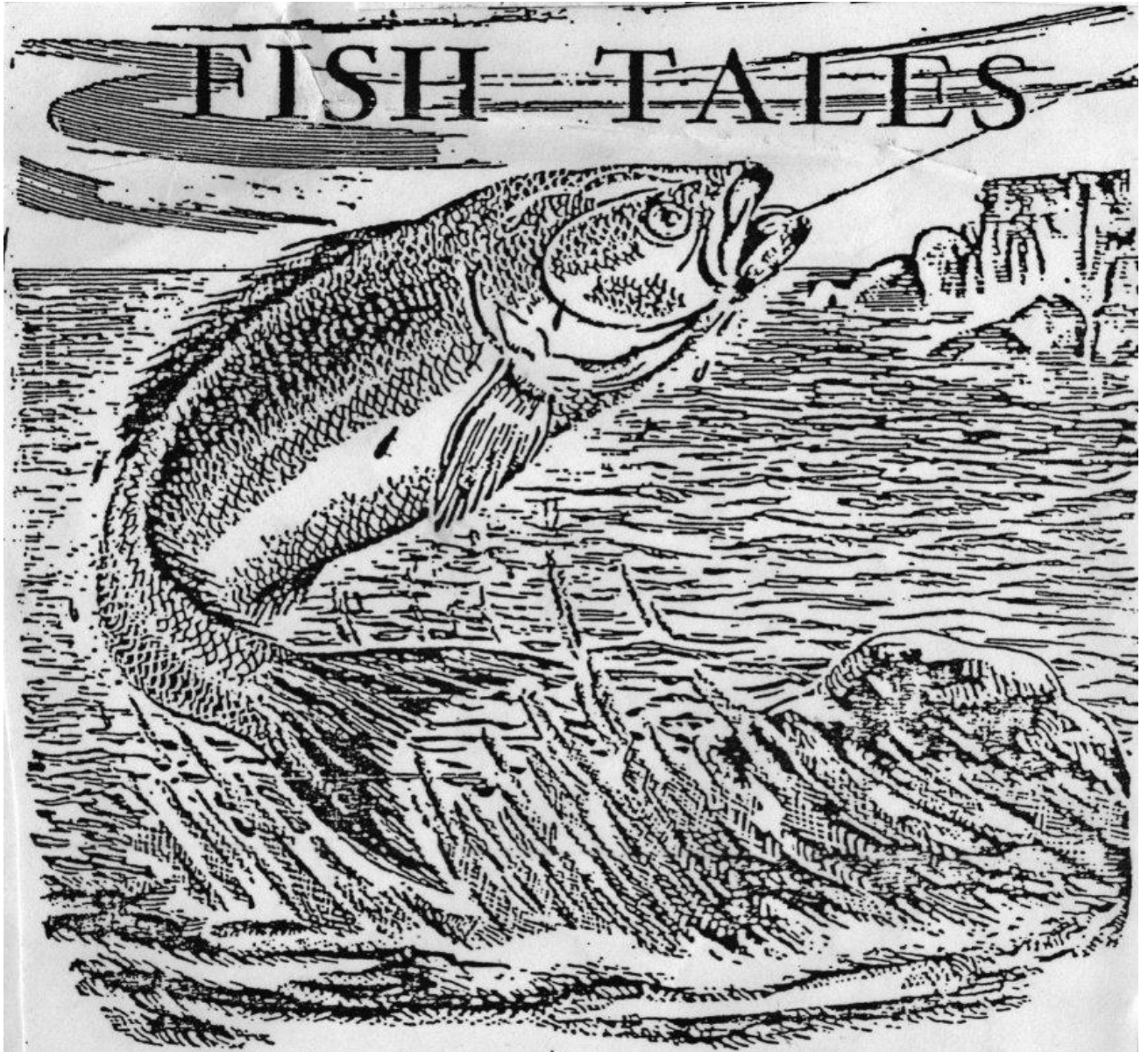

WHAT FISH IS IT?



They are a compressed, deep body-bodied fish with short heads, smooth mouths and bodies covered in prominent longitudinal bands. The scale pattern is strong, as the fins are too. They are very scaly and gape of the mouth does not reach the front border of the eye. (First Clue)

The colouring is silver to dark silver on the upper body, varying to greenish-grey.

Often caught while fishing for other species south of the 28th parallel.

Although they prefer a cellulose diet, sometimes are not fussy in what they eat. (Clue two)

Average length 33cm but do grow larger to 12 kilo or more. They edible, but the larger the fish, the more the flavour deteriorates.

PRECIOUS FISH SPECIES CLOSURE LIFTED IN TIME FOR CHRISTMAS

The closed season for west coast demersal scalefish ended 16 December, allowing fishers to catch the prized West Australian dhufish, pink snapper and baldchin groper, all of which are a popular addition to the Christmas table. The recently introduced two-month closure, from 15 October – 15 December, aimed at reducing the catch of important demersal species, has proven successful.

Recfishwest has urged people to continue fishing responsibly as the fishery reopens and has warned that although the closure season was a success, there is still a way to go to see the recovery of these precious fish stocks. Concern for the future of these important demersal species culminated in 2008 when research showed a depletion of these fish species. The two-month closure was one part of a new management package for demersal scalefish species which proved successful in achieving a 50 per cent reduction in catch. Recfishwest Acting Executive Director, Kane Moyle, said the community response was very positive and demersal scale fish have begun to recover well. “By forming strong partnerships with public and private fishing organisations we have been able to achieve our target of a 50 per cent reduction in the catch of these precious fish stocks without the need for exorbitant licensing fees or extending the closed season”, said Mr Moyle. “It has been very encouraging to see the state’s fishing community take these important sustainability issues seriously and we urge the public to maintain its vigilance as we continue to closely monitor the long term management of the species”, he said. As part of the management process, Recfishwest campaigned the State Government on the necessity for recreational fishers to use release weights when fishing for demersal scale fish given research has proven this significantly improves the ongoing survival of the species, particularly the popular dhufish. Recreational fishers are now required to carry a release weight and comply with regulations. NEW QUAD BIKES IMPROVE FISHERIES' ACCESS TO METRO BEACHES

Fisheries' officers are set for a busy summer, with a new boat and two new quad bikes to boost compliance resources in Cockburn and Warnbro Sounds and along the south metropolitan coast. Regional Manager, Tony Cappelluti, said the new patrol boat was now based at Rockingham and, for the first time, Fisheries and Marine Officers would have quad bikes to access popular beach fishing areas. "The \$270,000 patrol boat is already providing the Fisheries Officers with a fast, stable platform to carry out a range of patrol duties between Fremantle and Mandurah and up to 30 nautical miles offshore," Mr Cappelluti said. "It has an operating range of more than 200 nautical miles." The 8.5 metre, Naiad-design, Rigid Inflatable Boat replaces a seven metre aluminium plate design patrol vessel and provides officers with a much safer platform, for seaworthiness and for boarding other vessels, making it easier to pull alongside for compliance checks. It can carry up to four personnel and has a top speed above 40 knots. Mr Cappelluti said demersal fishing for recreational fishers reopens in the West Coast Bioregion from 16 December and the new patrol boat would help officers ensure the rules were being observed. It would be useful in a range of other compliance duties too. "Education of fishers is an important role for the officers who also oversee crab fishing, which has opened in Cockburn Sound and runs until 30 April," he said. "They will continue monitoring the annual pink snapper closure that is in place to the end of January in both Sounds. "The officers work to get the 'fish for the future' message across to both recreational and commercial fishers. They also monitor the local aquaculture industries and perform duties in the new Shoalwater Islands Marine Park. Cockburn and Warnbro Sounds are part of a fast-growing region and we must have the appropriate equipment to manage the fisheries." Mr Cappelluti said Fisheries and Marine Officers would deliver a more effective land based compliance and education service, by having better coastal access with its two quad bikes. "The two quad bikes will enable officers to carry operational equipment and access much larger areas than previously possible during patrols," he said. "The quad bikes will also provide officers with fast coverage of the coastal strip for fisheries work and for emergency management situations, when working jointly with Police and local authorities."
