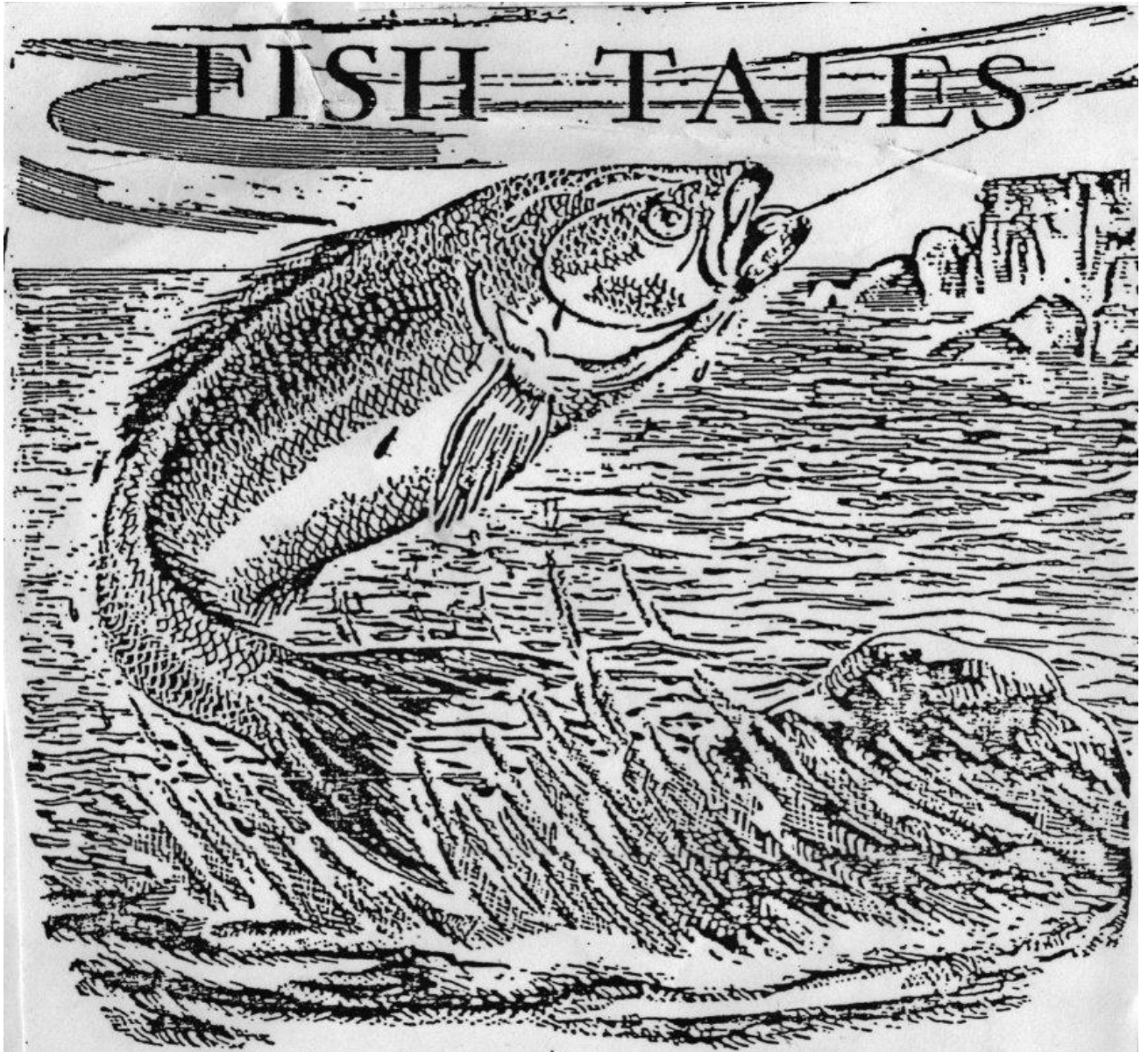

## **NEW ABROLHOS RULES KEEP WA'S LOBSTER FISHING WORLD-CLASS**

New rules for fishers at the Abrolhos Islands, to help protect sea lion pups, will ensure Western Australia's rock lobster industry maintains its international certification as a sustainable fishery. Principal Management Officer Graeme Baudains said the State's western rock lobster fishery was the world's first fishery to gain global certification, by the Marine Stewardship Council (MSC), 11 years ago and it had maintained its world-class status through constant attention to sustainability issues.

“Mandatory sea lion exclusion devices, or SLEDs, for rock lobster pots were introduced in 2006, for a special zone around the sea lion breeding colonies between Lancelin and Dongara,” Mr Baudains said. “The extension to cover specific areas at the Abrolhos Islands continues to enhance the environmental credentials of the fishery. “The industry's scientific reference group had identified risk areas, in waters less than 20 metres depth, around the islands in the Easter and Pelsaert Groups.”

Following industry consultation at the end of last year, the legislation is expected to be in place when the Abrolhos Islands lobster fishing season begins on 15 March 2011. Mr Baudains said the new regulations would require commercial and recreational lobster pots in the special zones to be fitted with SLEDs. “The Department of Fisheries will work closely with fishers to transition to full SLED implementation by 2012,” he said.

A special 12 nautical mile closed area, for the commercial rock lobster fishery, located on the border of the B and C fishing zones, will also come into force on 15 March. “The closed area, which is approximately 22 nautical miles West of Leeman, will be used for a five-year research program, examining the ecological effects of rock lobster fishing in deep water,” Mr Baudains said. “The closed area research program is also a condition of MSC certification.” Awareness sessions about the new rules for 2011 have been planned for commercial fishers, prior to the Abrolhos Islands rock lobster fishing season. ## TREVALLY

All species of Trevally are well known for their determined and powerful fighting ability, making them excellent sportfish on light tackle. Various species of Trevally offer plenty of action, from the aggressive Golden Trevally of the tropics and the dirty fighting coastal Silver Trevally to the powerful Giant Trevally.

**Physical Description:** Trevally have deep, flat bodies that are silver to white in colour. They have large lips but no biting teeth.

**Size:** Trevally range in size depending on the species. Silver Trevally grow from 500g to 10kg, Golden Trevally grow to 4kg - 8kg, and Giant Trevally can be anywhere between 1kg and 25kg.

**Habitat:** Trevally occupy both coastal and offshore waters. The best way to spot Trevally is to search for places where an obstruction has created eddies, as they tend to lay in wait for food in these areas. Try the corner of an island where the current sweeps past a rocky outcrop or the junction where two streams meet in the mangroves.

**How to Catch:** Bait - Trevally hit both baits and lures hard and keep going hard until they break the line, pull the hook or are caught, and this is what makes catching them such great fun. Generally, they prefer baits of yabbies, small poddy mullet, herrings, peeled prawns, whitebait, worms, pipis, and winter whiting. Lures to try include medium to deep diving lures, small chrome jigs and leadheads. Rod and Reel - A medium to fast taper boat rod with sidecast reel or eggbeater reel should be all you need. Line and Tackle - Smaller species will only need light line (2-4kg) and small hooks with minimum lead. Larger species will need heavy line and a heavy mono trace as they tend to rush for reefs and other structures to get rid of the hook.

**Hot Spots:** Trevally can generally be found from northern Queensland down to Tasmania and across to southern Western Australia. Golden Trevally can be found along the Queensland coast in estuaries, surf beaches and rocky and coral reefs. Silver Trevally are present in all states of Australia in inshore reefs, estuaries, beaches and bays. Giant Trevally occupy the warm tropical waters of northern Queensland, Western Australia and the Northern Territory.

## CAJUN CHICKEN WITH MANGO SALSA

4 single chicken breast fillets  
2 tbs vegetable oil  
2 tsp salt  
1 tsp garlic powder  
1 tsp onion powder or flakes  
1 tsp dried oregano  
1 tsp dried thyme  
1 tsp sweep paprika  
¼ tsp cayenne pepper  
½ tsp freshly ground black pepper

### *Mango Salsa*

1 ripe mango  
1 ripe avocado, halved, stone removed, peeled, finely chopped  
1 red capsicum, halved, deseeded, finely chopped  
½ red onion, finely chopped  
1 tbs fresh lime or lemon juice  
1 tbs finely shredded fresh mint  
Salt & freshly ground black pepper

### *Method*

1. Combine oil, salt, garlic and onion powders, oregano, thyme, paprika, cayenne and black pepper in a large bowl. Add chicken and turn to coat.
2. Heat a frying pan over medium heat. Cook chicken for five minutes each side. Transfer to a plate.
3. Meanwhile, to make salsa, cut mango cheeks close to seed and peel away skin. Finely chop. Combine in a bowl with avocado, capsicum, onion, lemon or lime juice, and mint. Season with salt and pepper. Serve with chicken.

*This Salsa could also accompany fresh fish and/or vegetables.*

## **DROP IN MARRON PROSECUTIONS REFLECTS SUCCESS OF STATE'S FISHERIES MANAGEMENT**

Fisheries Minister Norman Moore has welcomed reports of low levels of offending during the annual marron season, which ended 5 February. Mr Moore said reports from the Department of Fisheries indicated just six infringement fines were issued in the south metropolitan region to fishers with undersize marron, no licence or illegal gear.

“During patrols of dams close to the metropolitan area, Fisheries and Marine Officers also issued nine warnings on gear and undersize marron,” he said. “It is testament to the State Government’s boost to the numbers of fisheries compliance officers late last year, the success of our ‘Fish for the Future’ message and the lawful nature of most fishers that most people encountered by Fisheries staff were doing the right thing. “In the past, there have been serious issues of people fishing out of season. “Recently in Armadale Magistrates Court, 14 people were ordered to pay fines, mandatory penalties and court costs for offences related to possession of marron during the closed season or having undersize marron. All but one of those cases related to offences that occurred in 2010 and their combined cost means the offenders will collectively pay more than \$23,400 for the illegal fishing activity. Last month, the Midland Magistrates Court fined a further six people more than \$23,500 for marron offences that occurred in 2009 - including possession of marron during the closed season and having undersize marron or females with eggs.”

The Minister said catches during the marron season were limited at dams, due to low water levels, but river fishers fared better. “People who went marron fishing in South-West rivers had moderately good catches early in the season, but less as the season progressed,” he said. “By far the majority of fishers were doing the right thing. Fisheries’ staff issued four infringements for illegal gear use and each of those people must pay a fine of \$400. Two warnings were also issued for undersize marron and one fisher, apprehended at Harvey Dam just prior to the season opening on January 8, is being prosecuted.”

## **SALMON**

During autumn, schools of Australian salmon migrate in a westerly direction along Western Australia's southern coastline from the Great Australian Bight towards Cape Leeuwin. Many schools often round Cape Naturaliste and find their way as far north as Rottnest Island.

This spawning 'run', which provides the basis for a commercial and recreational fishery, normally occurs between late February and late April, with the majority of spawning believed to take place between Black Point (between Windy Harbour and Augusta) and Cape Naturaliste.

During this run, salmon often school inshore, moving along the beach. This schooling makes them prime candidates for commercial and recreational fishing.

### **Recreational Fishing Tips**

Salmon are a great sport fish to catch - on the right fishing tackle. Please don't use gear that is too light - if your line breaks, the fish concerned can be left with several hooks hanging from its mouth.

These hooks can affect the health of the fish and are potentially dangerous to other recreational or commercial fishers.

Schools of salmon move swiftly along the coast, which sometimes can make them hard to find. If you are not sure what is happening, talk to the local fishers who are usually happy to advise you on the current 'hot spots' for fishing.

## **SPICY INDIAN CHICKEN AND MANGO CURRY**

2 medium mangoes, peeled, sliced  
400ml can coconut milk  
1 tablespoon hot curry paste  
500g chicken breast fillets, cut into 3cm pieces  
4 medium shallots, sliced

### ***Preparation Method***

Place half the mango slices into the bowl of a blender with coconut milk. Blend until smooth.

Heat the oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Cook the curry paste, stirring, for two minutes or until fragrant. Add the chicken and shallots and cook for 5-7 minutes or until the chicken is just cooked through.

Pour in the mango puree and cook until heated through. To serve, stir in the remaining mango slices and accompany with rice and steamed broccoli.

## **THAI MANGO CHICKEN CURRY**

500g chicken breast, thinly sliced  
400ml can coconut cream  
1 large mango, sliced  
2 teaspoons red curry paste  
1 cup sliced shallots  
1 cup snow peas, trimmed

### ***Method***

Fry chicken meat. When browned, add red curry paste and cook for a further 2 minutes. Pour over coconut cream and add snow peas. Simmer 5 minutes. Add mango and shallots and heat through. Serve with rice.
