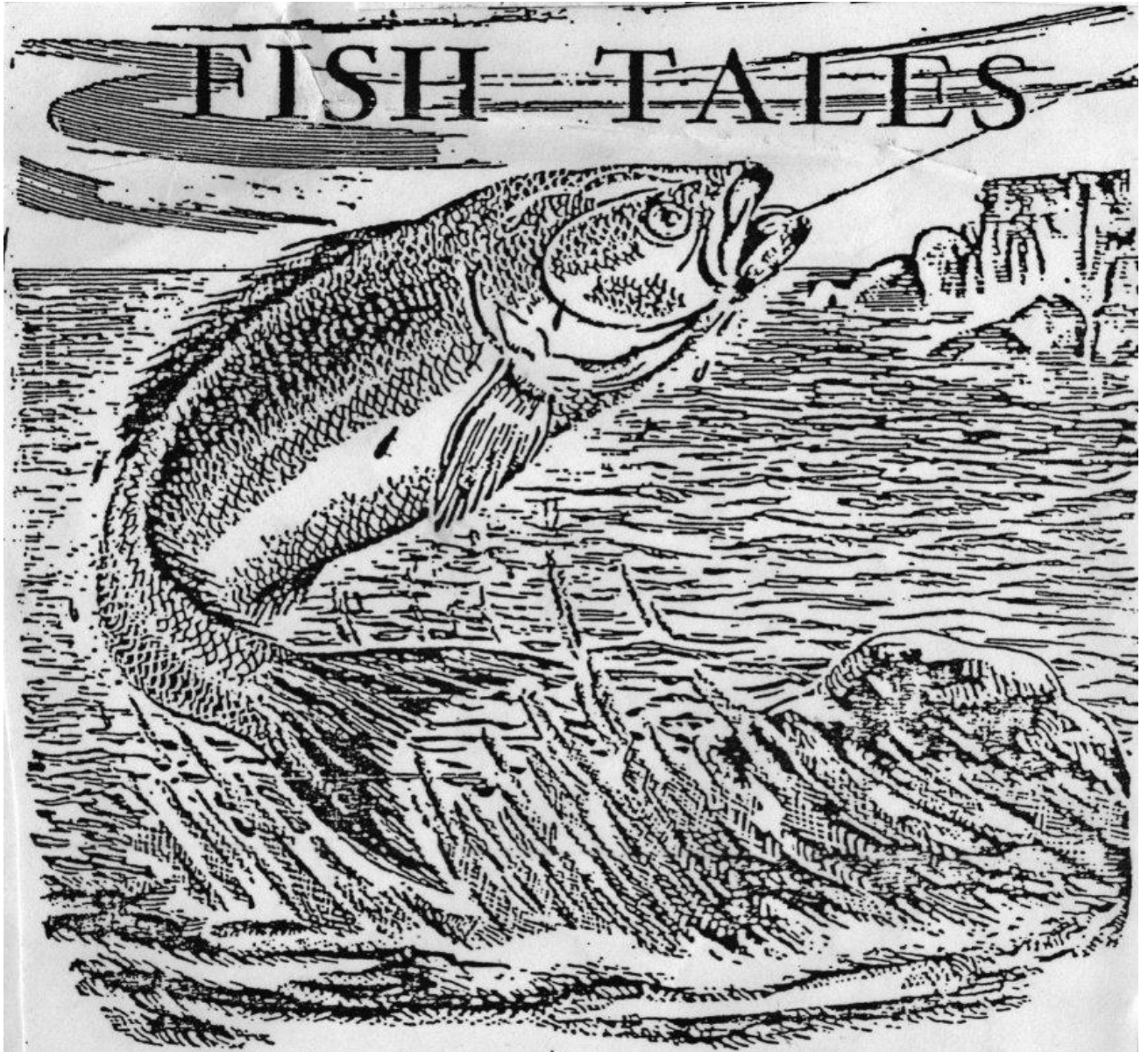

WHAT FISH IS IT?

Body elongate and compressed. Dorsal profile evenly arched from snout to caudal peduncle. Mouth rather large and slightly oblique, the gape reaching to below the front border of the eye. Both jaws with a single row of sharp, pointed teeth, those of the lower jaw larger than those of the upper jaw. Eye large, partly covered by an adipose eyelid. Two dorsal fins which are widely separated. The posterior dorsal fin is followed by a series of five to six detached finlets. Colour of body dark greenish-blue above, the sides yellowish green and silver below. Irregular wavy bars on the back and rows of dark spots along sides. Length 36cm. Distribution: all States.

What Fish am I?

The April mystery fish was a Pink Snapper.

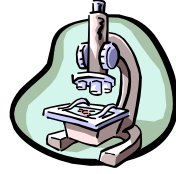

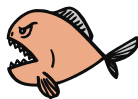
There will be a short meeting of a few minutes then one or two marine biologists will give short talks, after which members will be served supper refreshment, and you will be shown through where the scientists work, the educational lab, the exhibition hall, where you can travel the whole 12,000 km of WA coast and see all its marine creatures and fish. The ladies are sure to love it.

Remember the date! 4 May at 7.00pm sharp.

The building is the two-storey building on the **north side** of Hillarys Boat Harbour adjoining the Boat Ramp. **Not** the old concrete building at Watermans or AQWA on the south side. **It is important that you are in the building for the 7.00pm start**, as this is a secure building and nobody will be at the doors to operate their electronics after that time.

You can bring a camera to take photos of animals and other articles in displays, but you are not allowed to take shots of live marine animals, fish in tanks or the glass aquariums, the flash at night cause them stress and sometimes kill them. It will be a great night for all members and guests. You will see some great and interesting marine animals and things.

- The following is to be voted on at the May Delegates' Meeting:

Notice of Motion to Amend State Dry Casting Rules

The following amendment is proposed to the State Dry Casting Rules as adopted at the September 2010 Delegates Council Meeting. The amendment is to paragraph 3.5.3 - Line and Terminal Knots.

It is proposed that Rule 3.5.3 be amended to read

“Rule 3.5.3 Line and Terminal Knots. The breaking strain of the main line used is at the discretion of the caster. The gauge of the line shall be of a consistent diameter throughout. **There shall be no knots, splices or joins in the first 85 metres of the main line.** Any leader used shall comply with Rule 3.5.4. The style or type of knot used to attach any weight, dowel or swivel shall be at the discretion of the caster. Terminal knots used shall not exceed 100 mm in length. The knot length shall be measured from the edge adjacent to any weight, dowel or swivel affixed to the line.”

We who were with her at the time had an education lesson in some often used Australian words. John managed to calm things down and after cutting the hook shank managed to pull it through. Carolyn was rewarded for her bravery by also being the Field Day winner.

SEA URCHINS

What amazing animals of the oceans, these are one of the smallest creatures, yet they survive the longest of most life on earth, they can live up to 100 years and have the greatest immune system of all earth's life. Scientists are studying them to extend the life of us humans. They may be the answer to curing some of our diseases.

Several characteristics make sea urchins good choices for research. They have strong immune systems and long life spans; some can live up to 100 years. And they're very fertile; producing 20 million eggs at a time. Humans are born with innate immunity and also acquire additional immunities over time. Sea urchins only have innate immunity, with 10 to 20 times as many such genes than humans. Scientists hope that sea urchins will provide a new set of antibiotic and antiviral compounds to fight various infectious diseases.

"At a genetic level, ah, they're actually related to us. So sea urchins and humans share a common ancestor," Cristina Calestani, a developmental geneticist at University of Central Florida in Orlando, tells DBIS. "You really need a relatively simple system in order to study ... but still, also you want it to be complex enough and closer enough to vertebrate in order to use this information," Calestani says. "Sea urchins are one of the few invertebrates on our branch of the evolutionary tree, that share more genes with humans than fruit flies and worms -- and can be reproduced for research faster than other animals. That means researchers can produce a practically unlimited amount of material. And with a complete map of the urchin's DNA, they can better understand how genes work, so when diseases like cancer strike, maybe doctors will know how to treat and even prevent them."

TWO MEN IN A TINNIE

AAA Boating Championships

26 March 2011

Having not been boat fishing for the better part of the last decade, I was thrilled to be invited by Peter Osborne to fish with him in the AAA State Boating Championships. Leading up to the event, I had the opportunity to dig out gear that hadn't seen daylight since my Abrolhos Islands trips and I also discovered fishing tackle that I could not even remember buying.

I ended up packing a snapper winch, a medium bottom bashing/trawling outfit (with a spare reel), and a light spinning outfit, hoping these would cover all scenarios that may arise. I soon realised that my preparations were dwarfed by Peter Osborne whose boat was fully equipped to cover every situation, and he had even made up a load of rigs for me to use. We decided beforehand to launch the boat at Ocean Reef boat harbour and motor down to Hillarys so we could avoid any possible long delays at Hillarys.

6am saw the two intrepid fishermen motoring into Hillarys harbour to be met by a flotilla of boats readying themselves for the big day. Tying up to the wharf for the final sign on, registration, etc we were met by Pat Shinnick, the event organiser, his large sign on team, and volunteers from MAAC who provided coffee, tea, and breakfast for anyone who wanted it.

Like all fishing competitions, all anglers must strictly adhere to bag limits. While this applied to this event, you could only weigh in one fish per species. Points were heavily biased towards individual species rather than overall bag weight. The competition rules are available on the AAA website www.aaawa.iinet.net.au.

The siren sounded at 6.30am, signalling the start of the competition with all competitors leaving the harbour in an orderly fashion. We tried our luck for 10 or 15 minutes in the harbour before heading out. The fishing started off well with both of us catching herring, then a little later, some gardies. Moving on, we managed some beautiful sand whiting and Peter O even dragged in a nice skippy.

The score so far: Peter O four species; Peter P three species. Deciding to move further out proved productive for more species, catching both dhufish and flathead, but unfortunately not meeting the required size limits, therefore being released to be caught another day. As well as the day had started, the action seemed to slow right down, but the near-perfect conditions surely made up for the lack of suicidal fish to add to our Eskys.

Eventually all good days come to an end and faced with a long trip back to the harbour, it was time to head back to Hillarys where all bags to be weighed had to be in the cool, holding truck prior to the 3.30pm closing time. This was then locked and reopened for the weigh-in, which started at 4.30pm in the car park of Marmion Amateur Angling Club, overlooking the ocean complete with sponsors' and clubs' banners. The general feeling amongst the crowd from the people I spoke with was that the fishing was not as good as in previous years. However there certainly were some good catches and a variety of species.

Unfortunately for one angler, an 11kg Spanish Mackerel weighed in disqualified his whole bag as this fish was not on the eligible species list, which emphasises the need to check the rules on the website. As with the AAA Rock & Beach, which we attended, it was good to see Juniors involved with the running of the score sheets to the Competition Officer, Terry Bell, for final results. With the weigh-in complete, we all moved inside for the formal presentations and some light refreshments, made available by the Marmion Angling Club. Check the AAA website for results.

Whilst I do not know the names of many of the Officials, I wish to thank everyone involved in running this great event. I believe many of the volunteers were members of MAAC who elected to help out. I had a ball, and whilst it was my first foray into AAA Boating Events, hopefully it will not be my last. I owe a big thank you to my Skipper, Peter Osborne, for welcoming me to fish with him, and teaching me a few tricks of the trade.
